MESSAGE FROM THE PRINCIPAL

ELECTION DAY

The month started incredibly well with a huge turnout for our election stalls. It certainly helped that it was a beautiful sunny day. Our Cake and Craft stall made \$2368. An incredible effort! The most ever. Chaplaincy Sausage Sizzle took \$3,380.52, less expenses of \$832.00, giving a profit of \$2,548.52. A very successful day all round.

Thank you to everyone who donated goods on the day and to the volunteers that were on the stall. The day always has an incredible community feel and I loved catching up with many past families and students, including a number voting for the very first time.

PAST STUDENT SIMON ZA THANG

One of the past students I spoke to on the day was Simon Za Thang. He is doing incredibly well as a professional boxer and is about to challenge for the Australian title.

MURRUNDINDI

It was wonderful to have Murrundindi in the school last week. He was able to link the students learning in Year 1/2 to their mixing and making. I was unaware of how the Wurundjeri used carbon in their cooking just as we use bi carb soda to make things rise. He also provided Lemon Myrtle leaves for them to cook with. Year 3/4 students had the opportunity to ask questions about Murrundindi's ancestors and discovered many interesting facts including how they used Mountain Pepper Tree leaves to relieve toothaches. The 3/4 students tested their boomerang throwing skills, felt the healing vibrations through the floor as Murrundindi played the Yidaki and learnt to use indigenous symbols to represent their family.









Year 5/6 wrote some wonderful stories using traditional illustrations with the support of Murrundindi's knowledge.

Last week was the Preps first excursion. We always go to Healesville Sanctuary with a guided tour from Murrundindi. We certainly learn a lot more that the other schools we see just racing around the place. I was so proud of how our Preps conducted themselves during the day. Their quiet, calm manner saw them rewarded with the lyrebird walking along the log within 20 cm of them all, the platypus swimming around for all of us to see and a swan chasing us to protect her nest! Luckily, she was in the water and we were on the bridge. We are so incredibly lucky to have him so connected to our school.





PREP ENROLMENTS

Enrolments are open for prep next year and I have been conducting regular tours. Kerri and I took 5 families around on Saturday morning. We started this some years ago to support working families and it proves valuable. Please remember to put in your form if you have a sibling coming and remind any friends and family you have. Enrolments close on 25th July.

SECONDARY PLACEMENTS

I have completed the enrolments for Year 6 students to Secondary School this week. This process still sits with all primary schools. We notify students of the outcome on 1st of July.

NAPLAN

We received our preliminary results from NAPLAN last week. These results show us all areas except writing. They give us our student results, but no comparison to other schools or the state as yet. We saw an excellent improvement in year 3 Numeracy that had been a focus for the junior school. This was just reward for our hard work. We also had no student in 'needs additional support' in Year 5 Reading, a trend that has continued since the change to the new timing of NAPLAN. This is an outstanding result given so many children do not have English as their first language.

OPEN AFTERNOON

Yesterday we had our Education Week open. Parents visited classrooms from 2.30 - 4.00 and 5.30 - 6.30. Thank you to all of the parents that took part. It is very important for our students to see your interest. Thank you to all staff for setting up interesting activities in the classrooms and for giving up your time.

SOMERS CAMP



Thank you to everyone who was involved in the Free Dress day. We raised \$238. This will go towards the adoption of an endangered Quoll for the school.

Eastern quolls, once found all over Australia's southeast, disappeared from the mainland 60 years ago – and even where they remain in Tasmania, their numbers are declining. By symbolically adopting an eastern quoll, we are helping turn their story around. We'll be a part of rewilding endeavours to reintroduce the eastern quoll to the NSW South Coast. This is the first step in re-establishing them on the mainland, helping boost their chances of survival in the long-term. And for each eastern quoll we assist, we'll be helping hundreds of other native species too.

Our Quoll toy is currently out of stock, but will be sent shortly. We will also receive WWF booklet, adoption certificate and sticker.
